Dear Citizens of Burke County,

Welcome to the Burke County Sheriff's Office Annual Report. On June 9, 2020, we won re-election by nearly 85% of the vote! It is hard for me to believe that nearly 4 years have passed and even more remarkable that we are embarking on a second term in office. It seems like only yesterday that we started the job, brought along 20 deputies and filled an additional 10 deputy positions. We established a community services division, professional standards division, vice/narcotics division, traffic division, SWAT team division, and a training division. We did not have enough cars neither office space. However, we were patient and we worked as a team to serve the people of Burke County. We reduced both violent and property crimes by 50% and actively engaged our community at levels previously unknown. I know we will cherish that memory forever. I am exceptionally proud to represent the professional, committed, and compassionate men and women who comprise this sheriff's office.

The mission and vision of the Burke County Sheriff's Office are rooted in our commitment towards building positive relationships with our community. Our staff resists the pull of status quo and constantly strives for continuous improvement. We have hosted leadership, supervision and management courses at our agency, bringing in law enforcement personnel from across the state of Georgia. We continued our ongoing support of dozens of community events, dialogues, and neighborhood and civic association meetings throughout the year, to include our Citizens Police Academy and the Firearms Safety Course for firearms permits. Our ongoing goal is to develop and nurture healthy communications between our sheriff's office and the people we serve. Through community feedback and ongoing specialized training, our sheriff's office is evolving to provide the utmost in law enforcement service in a modern and rapidly changing environment. We stepped up the delivery of educational programs for our community. Since January 2017, we have graduated 7 employees from Faulkner University and another seven recently signed up for advanced degrees.

The Ahmaud Arbery and George Floyd cases have brought to light the need for a more professional and transparent sheriff's office. Additionally, the Brooks case in Atlanta underscores the need to support our law enforcement officers in the performance of their duties when they are acting appropriately under highly stressful conditions where seconds really matter. As we continue forward and look to the future, it is with great pleasure that I present this Annual Report to you as a token of our pledge to uphold our core values – Professionalism, Respect, Teamwork, Integrity, Courage and Service.


Sheriff Alfonzo Williams

I am Alfonzo Williams, the first African-American Sheriff of Burke County and first African-American Police Chief of the Waynesboro Police Department, Waynesboro, Georgia. I have 30 years of law enforcement experience, starting with the now defunct Augusta Police Department (APD). Over the course of my career, I have received six Police Officer of the Year awards from various civic organizations and law enforcement agencies. After the city and county governments consolidated in 1996, I worked for the Richmond County Sheriff's Office as a violent crimes investigator. During that same year, I joined the

Waynesboro Police Department as the Assistant Police Chief. In 1998, I worked for the Burke County Sheriff's Office as Investigative Sergeant specializing in violent crimes, particularly child abuse cases.

In 2001, I worked as an investigator with the Columbia County Sheriff's Office. I worked on patrol for a few months before transferring to the Criminal Investigations Division as a violent crimes investigator.

In 2002, I joined the CSRA Law Enforcement
Training Center. Later that year, the school was
reconstructed and renamed the East Georgia Regional
Police Academy and I was appointed Assistant Director. In

2002, I joined the District Attorney's Office (Augusta Judicial Circuit which includes Richmond, Burke, and Columbia Counties) as an investigator. I worked in the DA's Office until 2005, when I went back to the East Georgia Regional Police Academy as Director. I served as the Director for one year before rejoining the DA's Office, where I stayed until 2008, when I accepted an instructor position with Ken Jones and Augusta Technical College Peace Officers Training Academy.

In 2011, I was appointed Chief of Police of the Waynesboro Police Department. I served in this capacity for two years. In 2013, I was appointed Chief of Police of the Richmond County School System Department of School Safety and Security. In January 2017, I was sworn in as Sheriff of Burke County to serve a four year term. I have an Associate of Applied Technology Degree in Criminal Justice from Augusta Technical College (2001), a Bachelor of Science Degree in Organizational Management from Voorhees College (2005), a Master of Education Degree (Instructional Technology) from American InterContinental



University (2006). In February 2019, I completed a second Master's Degree (Master of Justice Administration) Faulkner University. Additionally, I have 12 credit hours towards a Master of Criminal Justice Degree at Troy University.

I taught part-time with Augusta Technical College as an adjunct instructor in the Criminal Justice program from 2006-present. I am married to Shirleta Williams and we have one daughter together, Chandler Williams. Kiara Williams is my older daughter.

Chief Deputy R. Lee Webster Jr.

R. Lee Webster, Jr. is the Chief Deputy of the Burke County Sheriff's Office. Lee is proud to have been born, raised, and educated in Burke County, GA. He has spent his entire life working IN and FOR Burke County and agriculture. He grew up working on the family farm with his father, Bobby Webster, where he developed a passion for farming and a love for policies that promote Georgia's #1 industry—AGRICULTURE.

He is the current president of the Burke County Farm Bureau and has served in that capacity for 36 years. He also was appointed by Georgia Commissioner of Agriculture, Gary W. Black, to serve as his representative on the GA Corn Commission. Lee was nominated by State Representative Gloria Frazier and appointed by then Governor Sonny Perdue to represent Burke County with issues of WATER and development of a State



Water Plan. Lee continues to represent Burke County, on the Savannah-Upper Ogeechee Water Council. Beginning in the spring of 2013 and through the end of 2014, Lee worked with, then 12th District U.S. Congressman John Barrow in the area of district constituent services. It's through these positions that he has worked to promote policies that promote our farmers and issues important to Burke County.

Lee has worked extensively with land development, growth planning, and zoning for Burke County since its inception by the County Commission in the early 90's. He has served on the Burke County Planning and Zoning Commission since September 1995. As a farmer and businessman, he has extensive knowledge of our area and a great friendship with its citizens.

In 2008, Lee had the honor of being elected to a four-year term as Coroner of Burke County. During this time, he met a very innovative Waynesboro Police Chief...Alfonzo Williams. That admiration and friendship led to an opportunity in 2016 when Williams, the newly elected Sheriff, approached Lee with an idea of how important agriculture is to Burke County and that a liaison for agriculture could enhance his vision for community policing.



On January 1, 2017, Lee joined the Burke County Sheriff's Office on a full-time basis as Director of Agriculture Services and Investigations. He went on to graduate from the State of Georgia Police Academy in May of 2017. In early August 2020, after the re-election of Sheriff Williams and the retirement of then Chief Deputy Lewis C. Blanchard, Sheriff Williams offered Lee the opportunity to help lead his administration as Chief Deputy.

Lee is passionate about ALL things Burke County. He considers it an honor to live and work the land chosen by his grandparents, who moved to Burke County in the 1920's from other parts of the country. He considers it a privilege to help serve and protect the citizens of our community with the vision of Sheriff Alfonzo Williams and his team assembled as the Burke County Sheriff's Office.

Major Chester V. Huffman, Jr.

Major Chester V. Huffman, Jr. began his law enforcement career in 1975 with the City of North Augusta, South Carolina. In 1982, he joined the Augusta Police Department (APD) where he attained the rank of Lieutenant and Commander of the Special Operations Bureau – Motorcycle Squad, Mounted Patrol Squad, Housing Authority Squad, Marine Enforcement Squad and SWAT. He also spent time overseeing the Office of Professional Standards (Internal Affairs and Public Information).

In 1996, after the abolishment of the APD, he was promoted to the rank of Captain with the Richmond County Sheriff's Office. As an Assistant Chief Jailor, he was

responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Charles B. Webster Detention Center (CBWDC). During his tenure at the CBWDC, the facility grew from its original 552 beds to a state-of-the-art institution containing over 1,000 inmate beds, an Inmate Processing Center, Medical/Mental Health Housing unit and a Visitor Center.

Major Huffman is a graduate of Aquinas High School and has earned a degree in criminal justice. He attended the University of Virginia at Quantico in 1996, where he successfully completed the F.B.I. National Academy (Session 184). Major Huffman holds P.O.S.T. Managerial Certification as well as Senior Instructor status, with instructor certification in the areas of General Instruction, Speed Detection, Firearms and Driver Training. Major Huffman has been actively involved in many facets of basic and advanced law enforcement training both at the local and state levels since 1984 and continues to teach.

Major Huffman is third in command with the Burke County Sheriff's Office, specializing in the areas of Administration and Detention. His primary focus is budget, personnel, policy and procedure, grants, needs assessment and State and National certification of the Detention Center.

School Resource Officers (SRO)



School Resource Officers (SRO) are an important part of the Burke County Sheriff's Office. These deputies are assigned to schools within the Burke County Public Schools System. An SRO role incorporates a variation in functions focused on prevention. However, each role played by the SRO is dependent upon the circumstances of the situation. In addition to being highly active and visible throughout the schools, each SRO is a valuable and accessible resource for students, parents, teachers and administration regarding law issues.

Having SROs assigned to the Public Schools within the county ensures a reduced response time for any calls for service, increases the deterrence of any criminal activity, and the SRO serves as the front line of defense when ensuring the safety and security of our schools. SROs serve a population of approximately 4,228 students in Burke County's six public schools.



Special Response Team (SRT)



The Burke County Sheriff's Office SRT was formed by Sheriff Alfonzo Williams at the beginning of 2017. SRT provides a highly trained and skilled tactical team as a resource for the county in handling critical incidents to reduce the risk of injury or loss of life to citizens, law enforcement officers, and suspects. Examples of calls that SRT could respond to include: hostage incidents, barricaded suspects, service of high-risk arrest/search warrants, manhunt operations, and any other critical incident requiring a tactical response. Additionally, the Burke County Sheriff's Office SRT will respond to any critical incident at Plant Vogtle.

Currently, the Burke County Sheriff's Office SRT is a collateral team (part-time) with each of its 16 members being assigned to other full-time duties within the Burke County Sheriff's Office when not on SRT calls or in training. SRT is often called upon and utilized to execute high-risk search/arrest warrants, assist federal agencies and to assist in emergency call-outs within Burke and surrounding counties.

Patrol Division

The Field Operations Division (Patrol Division) is the most visible division and is often referred to as being the "backbone" of the agency. The men and women that comprise this division provide emergency response in lifethreatening situations and non-emergency assistance to a variety of criminal, traffic, medical and civil matters as well as natural disasters that may impact the overall quality of life. Field Operations deputies provide a full range of law enforcement services to the residents of Burke County.

Community Services is another highly-visible division of the Burke County Sheriff's Office. The Community Services Division objectives are to foster a relationship



with the citizens, educate the citizens on different subjects, provide safety-related programs based on community needs and be active in our schools with teaching drug resistance programs and mentoring programs.

The Community Services Division accomplishes its mission through the development and presentation of various programs in response to the changing needs of the county, as well as maintaining established prevention, safety and educational programs. The duties of the members of this division include speaking to various groups on crime prevention methods, distributing crime prevention literature and maintaining liaisons with





Fostering relationships with the youth of Burke County is a top priority of the Community Services Division. The goal of our Explorer Post 225 Program is to enhance the Explorers' preparation for future roles as citizens, community members, leaders and future law enforcement officers. An objective of the program is to provide members with a basic knowledge of the field of law enforcement. The Explorers participate in competitions on a State



and National Level. They also partake in ride-alongs and assist in community services activities throughout the county. Camp Impact is a non-profit program hosted by Burke County Sheriff's Office to prevent continuous and repetitive youth criminal actions. The program targets young males and females ages 12-16. Camp Impact is designed to be educational, informative, challenging and instructional. We focus on strengthening their ability to comprehend and respond correctly to confusing and difficult situations. We also place emphasis on Drug and Alcohol Awareness, Behavior, Bullying, Gang Resistance, etc.






We use *Offenderwatch* to manage and monitor the whereabouts, conduct and compliance status of the registered offenders in Burke County. *Offenderwatch* provides the most accurate and timely information available. State Certification and Accreditation

The Burke County Sheriff's Office is now an officially accredited Sheriff's Office by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police. Sheriff Alfonzo Williams and his team have been working towards State Law Enforcement Certification for the past two years. To accomplish this goal, the Sheriff's Office was required to show proficiency in 129 state law enforcement standards.

Certification is a progressive and time-proven way of helping law enforcement agencies calculate and improve their overall performances. The foundation of certification lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives. Participating agencies conduct a thorough self-analysis to determine how existing operations can be adapted to meet these objectives. When the procedures are in place, a team of trained assessors verifies that applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by the joint executive committee that the agency has met the requirements for certification.

Trained assessors from across the state of Georgia completed their inspection of the Burke County Sheriff's Office, polices, procedures, equipment, response times, training, etc. and verified that BCSO has met or exceeded all 129 standards. The State Certification Joint Review Committee met and reviewed the on-site assessment report for our agency and approved our certification.

Certification status represents a significant professional achievement. Certification acknowledges the implementation of policies and procedures that are conceptually sound and operationally effective. The benefits of certification include but are not limited to:

- Confirmation that agency practices are consistent with progressive professional standards;
- Greater operational and administrative effectiveness;
- Enhanced understanding of agency policies and practices;
- Greater public confidence in the agency;
- Recognition in the field of outstanding achievement;
- Reduced liability potential; Greater governmental and community support.

Citizens Firearms Class



The Burke County Sheriff's Office hosts a monthly firearm safety course for the citizens of Burke County. This is a one day class designed to teach participants firearm safety, firearm familiarization and to further help them hone their marksmanship skills. This year we had the opportunity to host 7 courses (total of 39 students).




