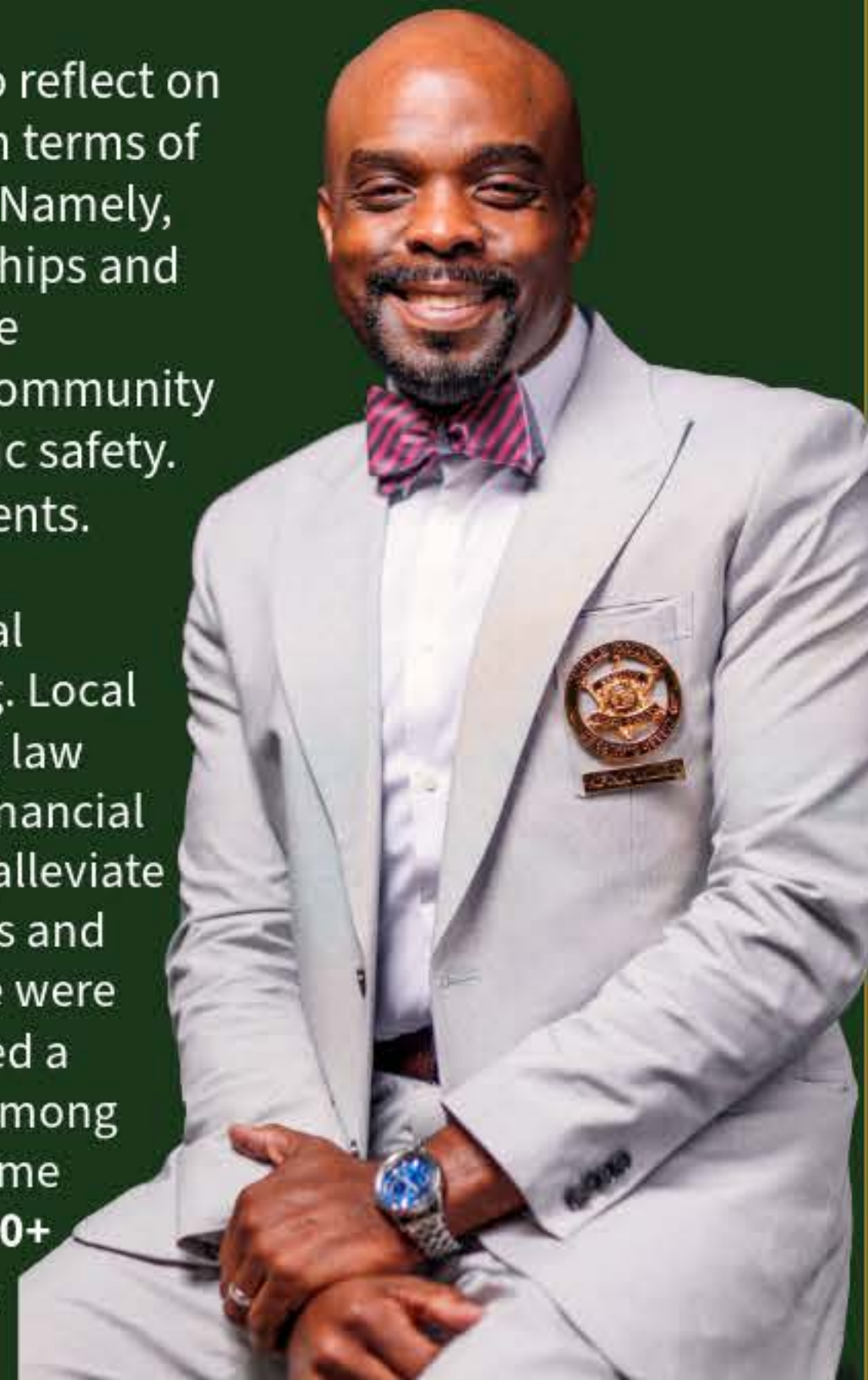
SHERIFF ALFONZO WILLIAMS

As the year-end approaches, it is important to reflect on the challenges and successes we faced in 2023. In terms of successes, we had many notable achievements. Namely, the strengthening of police-community relationships and partnerships. Building trust and fostering positive interactions between law enforcement and the community is crucial for effective crime prevention and public safety. This year alone, we held over **100** community events.

Another success was our efforts to address local budget issues by seeking state and federal funding. Local taxpayers shoulder a significant burden in funding law enforcement initiatives, and securing additional financial support from higher levels of government helped alleviate this strain. By advocating for funding opportunities and demonstrating the importance of public safety, we were able to continue our mission effectively. We secured a **\$1.3 million** dollar grant to reduce violent crime among our youth due to COVID, a **\$150,000** grant for a Crime Analyst and associated technology, and a **\$700,000+** grant from the US Attorney General COPS Office to hire six deputies.

We renegotiated our inmate medical contract, saving over \$100,000, used SPLOST funding to purchase and outfit 16 new patrol vehicles, and received a **\$53,000** grant from GEMA and Homeland Security to increase the successful prosecution of gang crimes. Furthermore, we submitted an application to the Governor's Office of Highway Safety sharing our enforcement data and community education strategies to reduce crashes, injuries and fatalities, which made us eligible to enter a drawing for a brand new 2023 Chevrolet Tahoe, fully equipped with all the bells and whistles for a traffic enforcement enthusiast, **AND WE WON THE TAHOE!**

Our office continues to train, coach, and mentor, inspire, grow, expose, nurture, and cultivate the professional development of our team members. We are growing our influence and showing our employees we care about them. We are also proud of our college graduates and those who have increased their knowledge through advanced training.



With several announced retirements in June, we celebrated their years of service and dedication and we restructured the sheriff's office, offering promotional opportunities and professional growth and development to our personnel. This was a huge boost in morale to our committed and deserving team members and it gave hope to those aspiring to achieve growth within the sheriff's office.

However, there were challenges as well. One ongoing challenge is reducing the fear of crime within our community. We strive to create safe environments where residents feel secure and confident in their daily lives. By implementing proactive community policing strategies and engaging in open dialogue with community members, we continuously work toward alleviating these fears. Addressing gang activity and violent crime is an ongoing challenge as these issues can have a significant impact on the overall quality of life for residents. By implementing targeted enforcement strategies, collaborating with community organizations, and providing support services to at-risk individuals, we are reducing these issues and creating safer communities.

The contentious relationship with the county manager's office and certain commissioners was another challenge we faced. We want to get back to good and responsible governance and we will continue to find ways to work for the betterment of the people of Burke County.

Looking ahead to 2024, we will continue to invest in the professional development and well-being of our officers to ensure a highly skilled and motivated workforce. Improving the overall quality of life for those served by law enforcement will remain a priority. This includes addressing social issues, collaborating with community partners, and implementing innovative approaches to crime prevention and public safety.

In summary, we have faced both challenges and successes in 2023. As the New Year approaches, the focus should be on strengthening the relationship between police and the community, addressing cyber security challenges, reducing the fear of crime, seeking funding support, combating gang activity and violent crime, and investing in employee development. By working collectively towards these goals, law enforcement can continue to serve and protect their communities effectively.

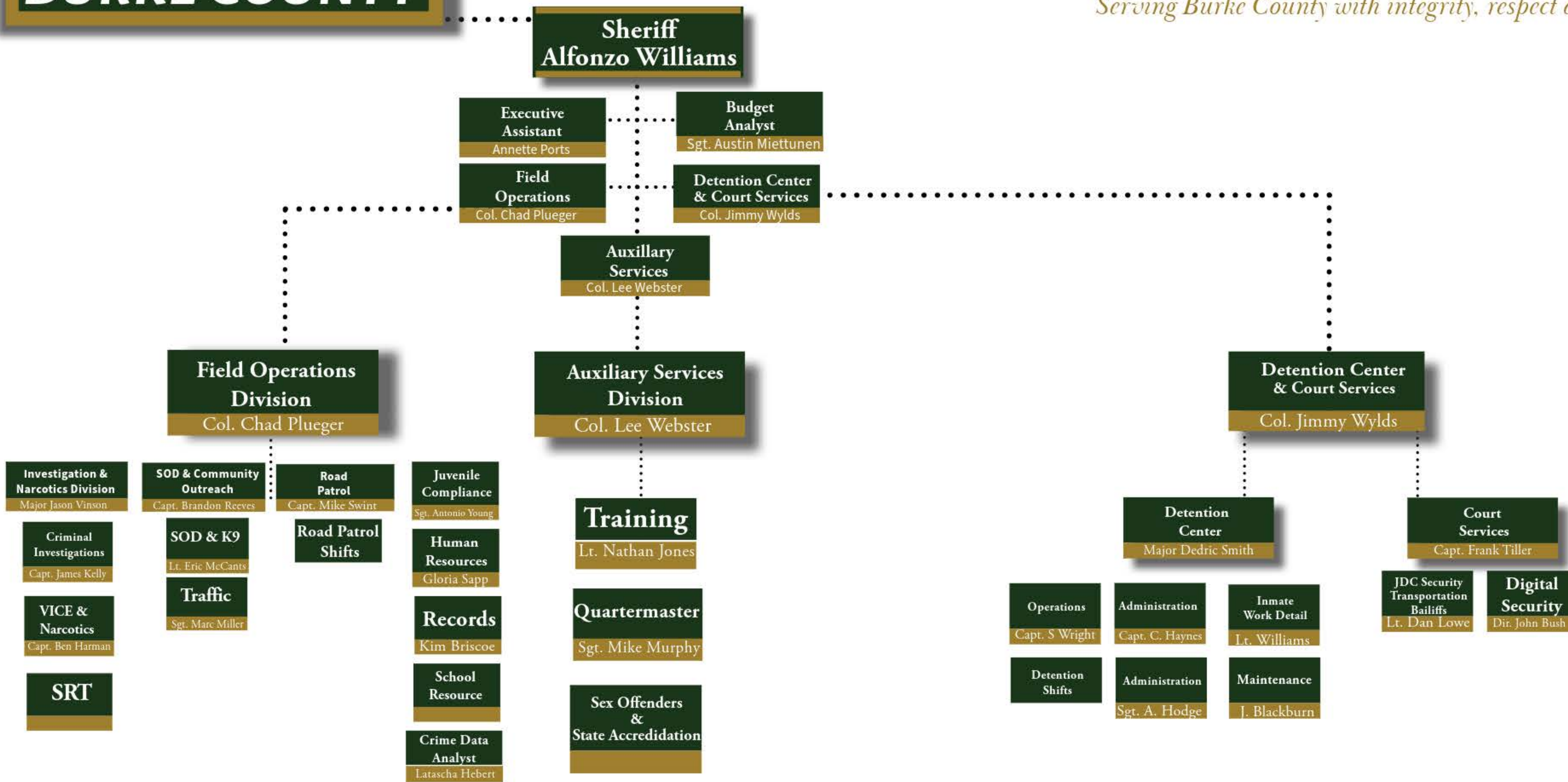

FIELD OPERATIONS

Field Operations is comprised of road patrol, traffic, school resource officers, community outreach, records and sex offender registry. Field Operations deputies provide emergency response in life-threatening situations and non-emergency assistance. The road patrol, also known as uniformed patrol, operates on two, 12-hour shifts that are commanded by a lieutenant, sergeant, and corporal, and patrol a specific zone of Burke County. Field Operations deputies provide a wide range of law enforcement services to the residents of Burke County. The division is commanded by Colonel Chad Plueger.

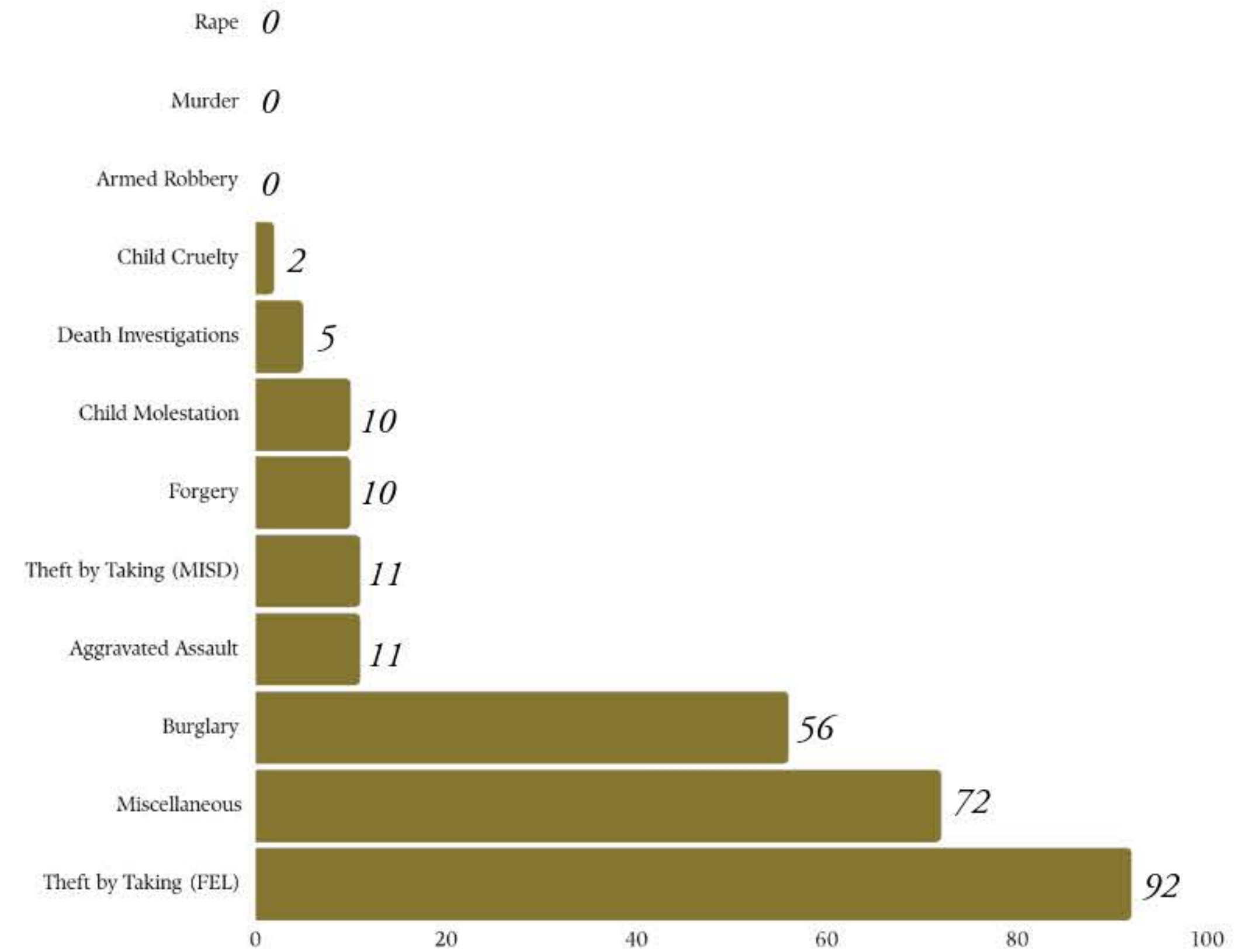

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISON

SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM (SRT)

The Special Operations Division is a proactive team that provides operational support to the Sheriff's Office as well as local, state, and federal law enforcement partners. SOD's primary focus is to lower crime in high crime areas through DDACTS (Data Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety) based on statistics.

Special Operations utilizes techniques such as selective patrol and saturation patrol to assure compliance with Federal, State, and local laws. They are deployed based on crime problems and statistics in a specific give area as well as requests from citizens.

Special Operations Division Team Members handle high-risk warrant service, barricaded dangerous subjects, hostage rescue and search and rescue and canine services.

The Burke County Sheriff's Office Special Response Team (SRT) provides a highly trained and skilled tactical team as a resource for the county in handling critical incidents to reduce the risk of injury or loss of life to residents, law enforcement officers, and suspects. Examples of calls the SRT could respond to include hostage incidents, barricaded suspects, service of high-risk arrest/search warrants, manhunt operations, and any other critical incident requiring a tactical response. Additionally, the SRT will respond to any critical incident at Plant Vogtle. In 2023, the SRT had 29 call outs.

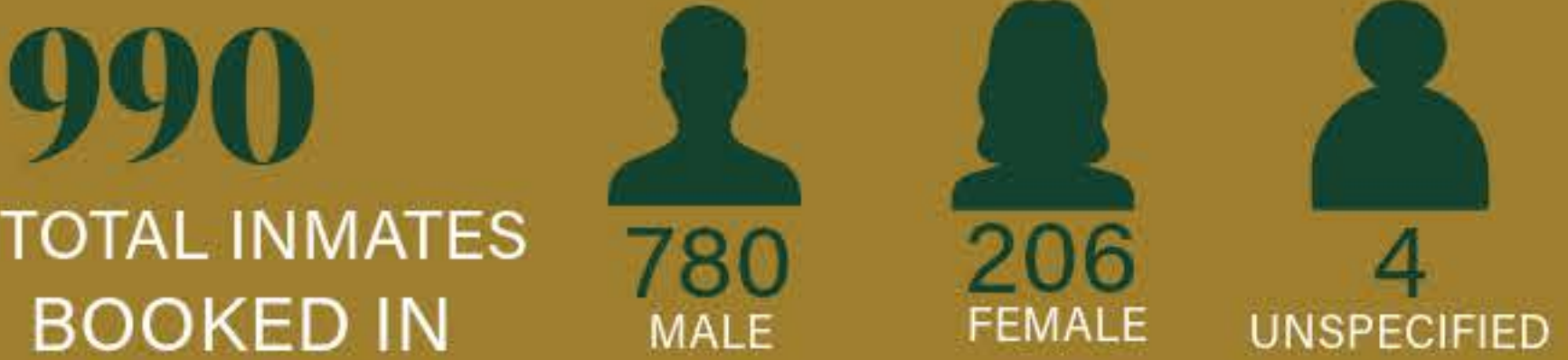


DETENTION CENTER

Detention Services includes the Burke County Detention Center, inmate transportation and supervision of inmate work crews. The Detention Center detains all arrested offenders. It is commanded by Major Dedric Smith. The Detention Center operates with 36 personnel. The jail, which was renamed the Burke County Detention Center in January 2017, houses those who have been arrested for misdemeanor and/or felony offenses.

The Auxiliary Services Division encompasses Training, Procurement, Fleet and IT. The majority of the division serves those within the Sheriff's Office as a whole. Training is a key focus of the Burke County Sheriff's Office, ensuring deputies are well-equipped as they serve the community. The BCSO Training Staff serves as adjunct instructors for the Georgia Public Safety Training Center's Local Basic Law Enforcement Academy. During the year, the Sheriff's Office had six personnel attend BLETC and four personnel attended BJOC. Fleet maintains the vehicles of the agency, and Procurement ensures the agency is getting the best cost possible on the items the Sheriff's Office purchases. The Auxiliary Services Division is led by Colonel Lee Webster.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS



School Resource Officers (SRO) deputies are assigned to schools within the Burke County Public Schools System. An SRO role incorporates a variation of functions focused on prevention. However, each role played by the SRO is dependent upon the circumstances of the situation. In addition to being highly active and visible throughout the schools, each SRO is a valuable and accessible resource for students, parents, teachers, and administration regarding law issues. Having SROs assigned to the public schools within the county ensures a reduced response time for any calls for service and increases the deterrence of any criminal activity. Additionally, the SRO serves as the front line of defense when ensuring the safety and security of our schools. SROs serve a population of more than 4,500 students in Burke County's six public schools.

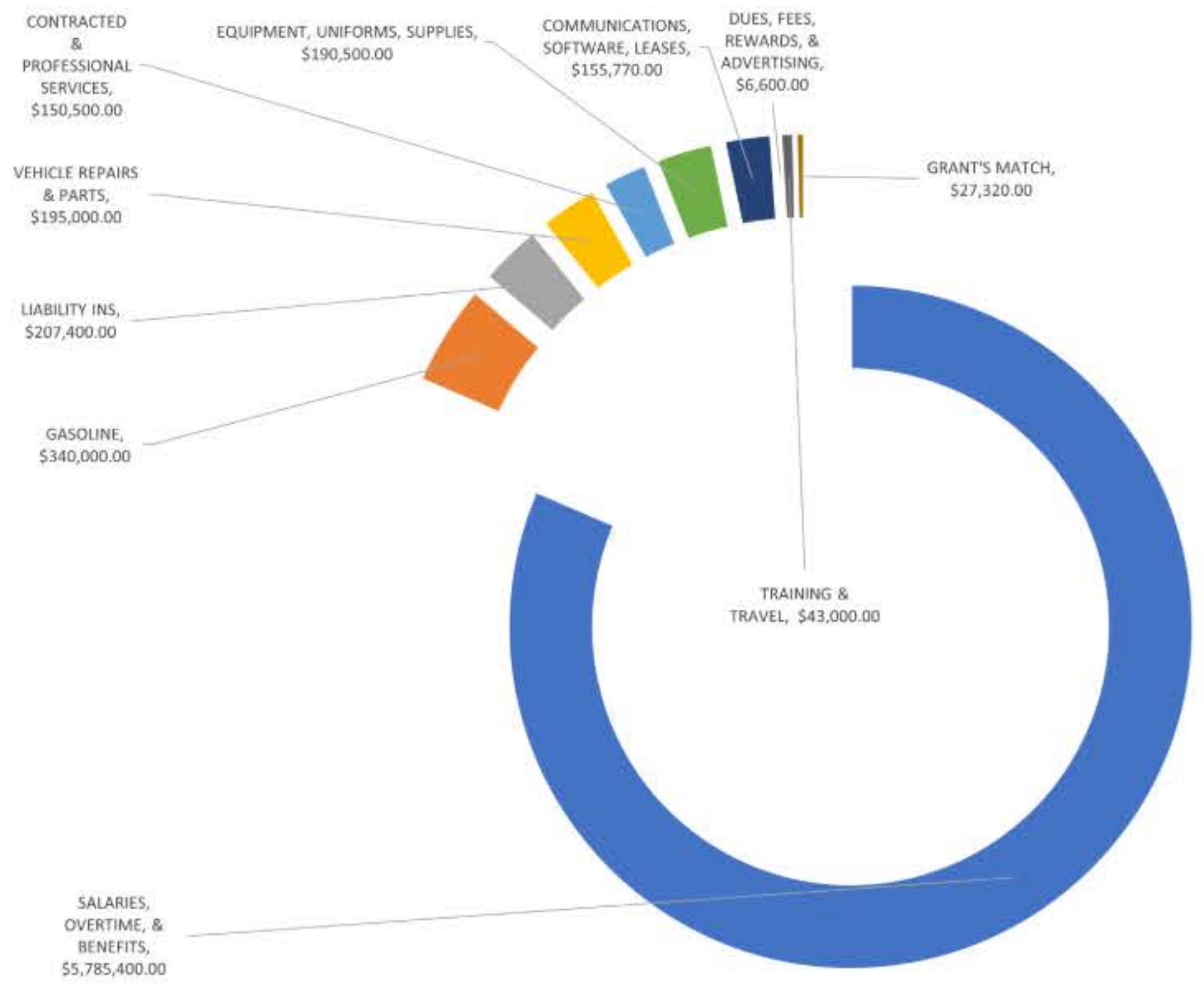

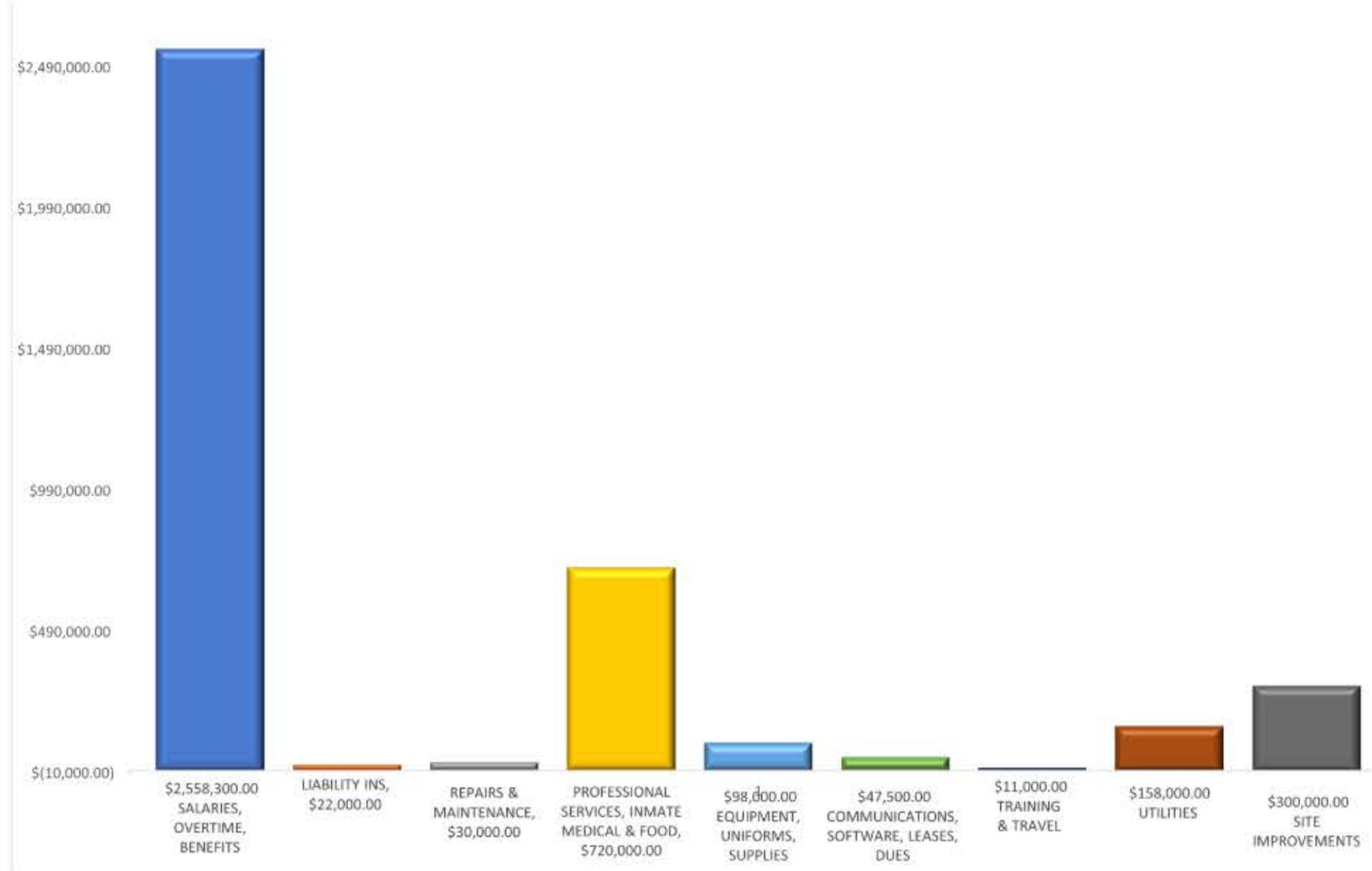

The Crime Data Analyst role is to gather, compile and interpret data from crime reports to study and research that data to identify and possibly predict patterns of crime. The analyst helps law enforcement focus on areas of concern or potential problem areas while providing strategic, statistical and investigative support to law enforcement. The Analyst is to assist with administering and maintaining crime analysis databases and tracking systems (Saferwatch), also helping to allocate and deploy police resources effectively.

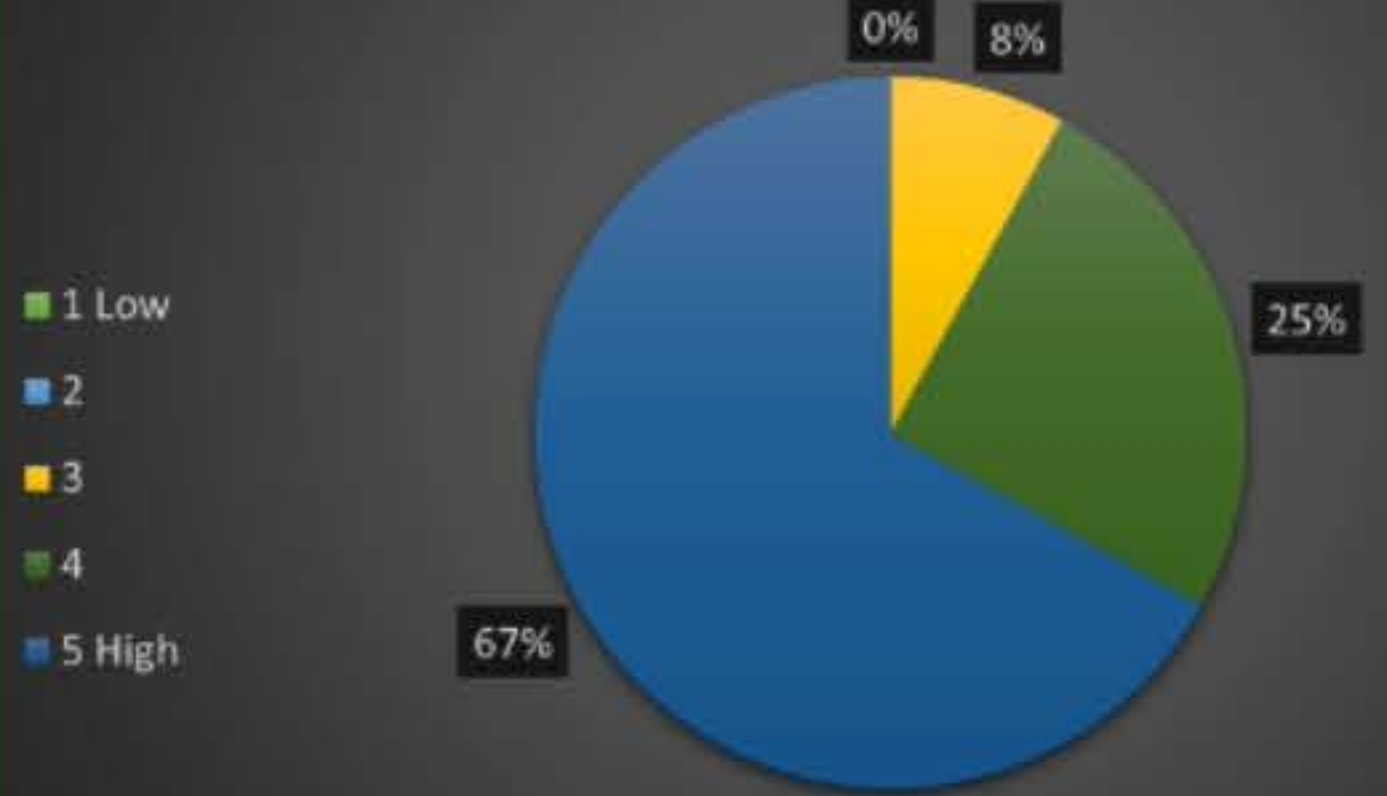
How do you feel about your safety and security while inside Burke County?



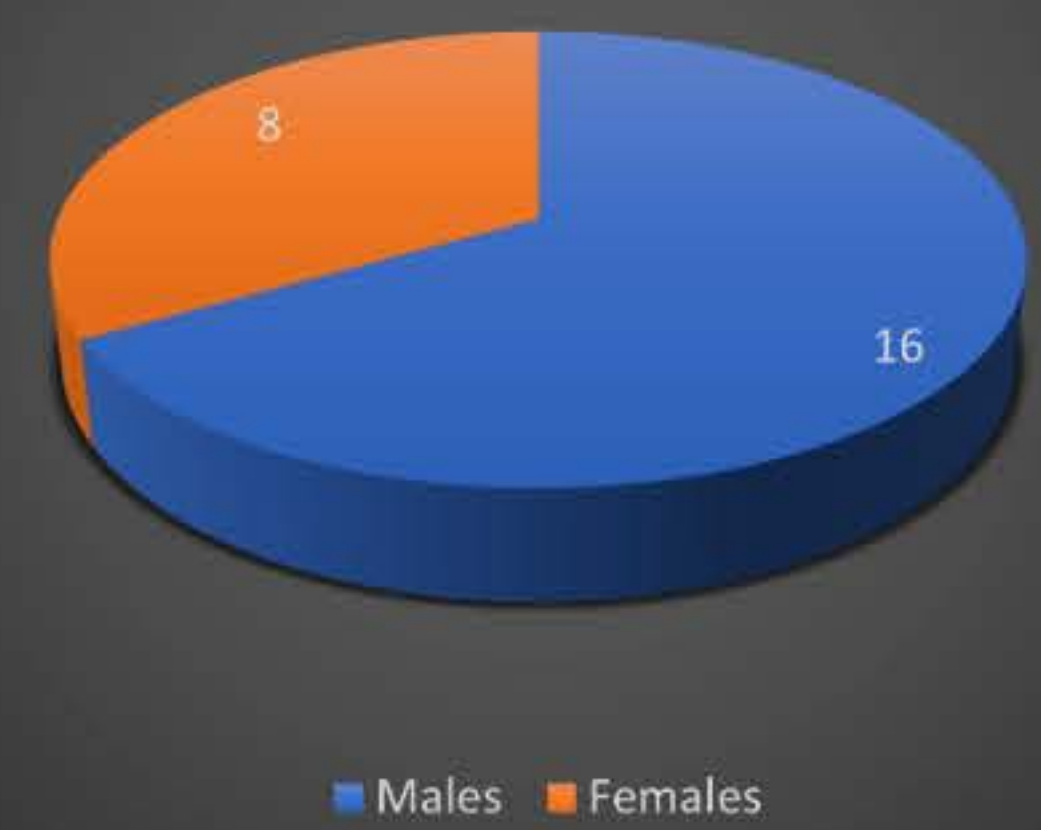
Which of the following crimes is the largest concern in Burke County?
